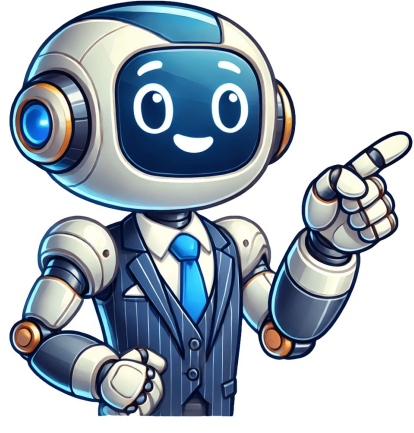

This is because the connotation of the first clause is continued. However, when the conjunction is but the correct answer is hate. This is because the connotation of the first clause is not continued in the second clause; it gets inverted due to the role played by the conjunction, but.
