Where It Falls ShortMy biggest complaint about Splice is the scrubber, or lack of one. In the video editing mode, it's difficult to get to exact moments in a long project, which is frustrating. There's a workaround if you pop over to the audio editor tab, which features a great little scrubber, but it's obnoxious that you have to do that. Beyond that, Splice is pretty limited, so don't expect a ton of options or features. It lacks video adjustments like exposure, highlights, and shadow levels, and it doesn't feature much in the way of audio editing outside of trimming and volume. It's built as an easy way for amateurs to string together various clips into a single video, add some text, and call it a day. It's not meant for much more than that and hard to push it further than any intended uses.
