Additionally, if the conservatory roof doesn't have proper drainage systems, rainwater can pool in certain areas. This pooled water can attract dirt and debris, leaving behind a grimy residue. The structure of the conservatory and the materials used for the roof are also important factors to consider. If you have a glass roof, you may want to clean it more regularly to ensure you're receiving the best energy efficiency (dirty glass can prevent your conservatory from getting warm), keeping up aesthetics and maintaining a clear view to let natural light through, and to prevent staining. Semi-Annually For conservatories in very clean, rural areas or in regions with mild climates, cleaning the roof every six months may be adequate. However, it is not recommended for all roof types. This would be best suited to more resilient, low-maintenance roof materials like tiles and roof panels. Annually Conservatories with more complex structures or those in areas with higher pollution levels may benefit from annual cleaning. This ensures that any significant buildup of dirt, grime, or moss is removed before it causes damage. Here are the essential tools you'll need: Cleaning Products Mild detergent or conservatory cleaning solution: These products can effectively remove dirt, grime, and other contaminants from your conservatory roof. Safety should be a top priority when using ladders, so make sure it's the right height and stable. Pressure washer A pressure washer can be a great tool for cleaning glass, plastic, tile or polycarbonate roofs, provided you use it on a low-pressure setting. It helps to remove stubborn dirt and clear grime that would not be removed with a regular hose. Be cautious not to damage the roof with excessive pressure, as this can affect the seal and coating. Moss killer In cases where moss or algae have taken hold on your roof, common with many polycarbonate roofs, a moss killer or algae remover can be a valuable addition to your cleaning equipment. Instead of regular cleaning we recommended self-cleaning glass (or Active Glass) for a conservatory roof. "The glass has a transparent coating that reacts with UV rays. When rainwater spreads evenly over the glass it breaks down any dirt and simply rinses it away.
