Applying for a CA License If you're 15½ years old or above, you can apply for a learner's permit. However, if you're under 18, you need to take Driver's Education to get a permit. When applying for your license, provide the required documents. Looking for employment authorization in California? You'll need an Employment Authorization Card or a valid I-94 stamped "Refugee," "Parole or Parolee," "Asylee," or Section 207, Section 208, Section 209, Section 212d(2), HP or PIP. Additionally, you may require an immigration judge's order granting asylum, a Mexican Border Crossing Card with valid I-94, or a U.S. Border Crossing Identification card with valid I-94. Some people also need certificates of completion for driver's education and a Certificate of Enrollment In A Classroom Driver Education And Driver Training Program. DMV offices provide various services, including vehicle registration, driver license, and ID card processing. You can find your nearest field office using regional maps and make an appointment online or by calling 1-800-777-0133 before visiting the DMV office. To get a CA permit test, you'll need to pass both the written exam and vision screening. To obtain a California driver's permit, you must be familiar with state traffic laws, road signs, and safe driving rules. To prove your out-of-state permit and training, provide Form DL 33 or a letter from your out-of-state secondary school. Commercial Test #1 Commercial Test #2 To get a driver's license in California, you must be at least 16 years old and meet certain requirements: Provide proof of identity, such as a birth certificate or passport; Give evidence of living in California, like a utility bill or rental contract; Pass written knowledge tests and a vision test; Take a driving course (if under 18); Complete behind-the-wheel training (if under 18); Get your driver's license once you've fulfilled all the requirements. The cost to get a driver's license in California depends on age and whether it's a first-time license or renewal: First-time drivers under 18 years old pay \$33; First-time drivers 18 years old or older pay \$36; Renewing drivers of any age pay \$36; Applying for a commercial driver's license (CDL) costs \$49; Renewing a CDL is \$38. To apply for a license in California, you'll need to bring specific documents, which may vary depending on your situation. These typically include proof of identity, Social Security number, California residency, and legal presence. If under 18, completion certificates for driver's education and behind-the-wheel training are also required. To schedule a driving test, visit the DMV website at www.dmv.ca.gov, click on "Appointments," select "Driver License Test," enter your information, choose a location and date, and confirm the appointment. Alternatively, you can call 1-800-777-0133 to schedule over the phone. Getting a learner's permit in California involves several steps: meeting eligibility requirements (age 15 1/2 years old or older), completing driver's education with at least 30 hours of classroom instruction, passing a written test at the DMV, providing your thumbprint and photo, paying the fee, and starting practice driving under supervision. Those under 18 must complete an additional 6 hours of behind-the-wheel training. Note that learner's permit holders have restrictions on driving alone or without a licensed driver in the passenger seat, so it's essential to understand these limitations before applying. Check the California DMV website for specific requirements and details regarding your situation. To avoid losing your permit or facing penalties, it is essential to follow all restrictions when driving during certain hours. In California, individuals under 18 years old must complete at least 6 hours of behind-the-wheel training with a licensed instructor if they do not meet the age requirement for a full license. This training must be completed at a DMV-licensed driving school or with a licensed instructor who is at least 25 years old and has held a valid California driver's license for at least three years. Additionally, it is recommended that you practice driving with a licensed driver aged 25 or older and holding a valid California driver's license. It's crucial to note that you must hold your learner's permit for at least 6 months before taking your driving test in California. Just makin several mistakes or breakin big rules like runnin red light or causin accident will probably make you fail test. So, practice safe driving habits and follow all traffic laws during practice sessions so you feel confident and ready for test day. Yes, you can use your own car for driving test in California, but it gotta meet some requirements: 1) Your car must be registered with DMV and have valid license plates; 2) Your car must be insured and you must have proof of insurance with you on test day; 3) Your car must be in safe working condition with workin brakes, signals, and lights; 4) Your car must have current registration sticker and functioning horn. If you plan to use your own car, give it good inspection beforehand to make sure it meets all requirements. Also, make sure you are comfortable driving your own car and that it is well-suited for specific test location. On test day, arrive early and bring all required documents like driver's license, learner's permit, proof of insurance, and registration. If you fail driving test in California, you will get score sheet showing areas where you made mistakes or need improvement. You can schedule another test but you must wait at least two weeks before taking it again. Also, you gotta pay fee for each test you take regardless if you pass or fail. This fee varies depending on location. If you fail multiple times, consider takin driving lessons from certified instructor to help you identify and correct any issues with your driving skills. Remember that failing test don't mean you are bad driver, it just means there are areas where you need to improve. By pratcing and preparing for test, you can increase chances of passing and becoming safe and responsible driver on California roads. There are also several restrictions that apply to new drivers in California: 1) Permit restricions - if you are under 18, you must hold learner's permit for at least six months before taking driving test; during this time, you must complete at least 50 hours of supervised driving practice including at least 10 hours of nighttime driving. 2) Passenger restricions - for first 12 months after licensure, you cannot drive with passengers under age 20 unless licensed driver over age 25 is present in vehicle. After first 12 months, you cannot drive with more than one passenger under age 20 unless licensed driver over age 25 is present in vehicle. 3) Curfew - for first 12 months after licensure, you cannot drive between hours of 11:00 pm and 5:00 am unless accompanied by licensed driver over age 25 or have valid reason for driving (like work or school). 4) Cell phone use - First year after getting licensed, you can't use your cell phone or other electronic devices while driving, even if it's hands-free. Violating these rules can lead to penalties and might delay getting your full driver's license. As a new driver, take these restrictions seriously and practice safe driving habits all the time. To get a driver's license in California, you'll need to start the application process online by filling out the application form on the DMV website. Once completed, visit a DMV office with necessary documents, take vision and written tests (if needed), and pay the required fee. Note that due to COVID-19, some offices may be operating at reduced capacity with longer wait times. If you have a learner's permit from California, you can drive in other states as long as you follow their laws and restrictions. However, some states might have additional requirements or restrictions for out-of-state drivers with learner's permits. Check the state's DMV website before driving to ensure legality and safety. A regular driver's license in California is typically valid for 5 years from issuance, but if you're over 70, it's only valid for 2 years. Certain medical conditions or driving violations might lead to restrictions or a shorter validity period. To renew online, you must be between 21-70 years old, have no driving violations or medical conditions requiring an in-person renewal, have a Social Security number on file with the DMV, and have a current mailing address. If you meet the eligibility criteria, you can renew your driver's license online through the DMV website by providing required documents such as your license number, date of birth, and Social Security number. Alternatively, if not eligible for online renewal, you must visit a DMV office in person. For international students or foreign residents in California, steps to obtain a driver's license are as follows: 1. Verify legal presence: You need to prove that you are legally present in the U.S. with required documents such as a valid visa, passport, and I-94 form. 2. Obtain an instruction permit: Pass a written test on traffic laws and signs to get an instruction permit. Schedule an appointment or take it online, providing necessary documents. 3. You must meet certain vision requirements to obtain your driver's license in California, including having at least 70 degrees of horizontal field of vision in each eye or a combined total of 140 degrees. You should be able to see clearly without turning your head. If you fail the initial vision test, you may need to visit an eye specialist. Once you meet these requirements, you can apply for your driver's license. It is essential to notify the DMV if your vision changes after obtaining your license. You can use a rental car for your driving test in California, but it must be in good condition and have valid registration, insurance, and safety features such as horn, turn signals, brake lights, and windshield wipers. The rental agreement or certificate of insurance can serve as proof of insurance. If you fail the driving test, you can retake it after a minimum of 2 weeks. You will need to make a new appointment, pay the testing fee again, and bring all required documents.
