This movement comes from the addition of a sixth note in the minor pentatonic scale (A String A"9A° key in the example) Â" We call it Â"BSÂ" (Flat 5) because it is the note that occurs before the V. The b5 provides a feeling of Â"pullingÂ" which is not found on other bass scales due to the "walk up" from note IV to note V. This additional note can give us a great sense of groove, and is a great note to use in the transition. Tip Skill: The note B5 should never be "landed", but only "played", which means we should always play another note on the scale after it. The cream "Sunshine of Your Love" has a great bass line that uses this note b5. You can play it using the TAB below: Another great song using the Blues scale is Vulfpeck "Dean Town" listen to the bass line at 3:20 to hear a "walk-up" from note IV to note V! The right way to practice with bass scales There's no "right way" in particular to learn music, but it's definitely a right way to practice. Developing good habits in your practice regime can make learning music infinitely easier, and can help you memorize the positioning of notes as well as the positioning of your fingers. Practicing the scale in this way also helps to develop better muscle memory, and that's why musicians can play some pretty amazing lines (like Victor Wooten, here). Singing the notes while we play them is another great technique to put into your training regimen when you try your bass balance. Even if you're just starting out, making an attempt to match your voice to your instrument is a great way to sharpen your ears and sound! Bonus Skill Tip: Keep a diary close to the bottom and keep track of what your practice every day. Write down what you played, how long you practiced, and keep a record of any discoveries or reflections you might have had that day. This is a great way to keep track of your progress and growth. Avoiding bad habits with bass scales is very easy to get comfortable bass scales (or music in general) in our favourite comfortable armchair or couch, and it is usually more relaxing to practice this way. However, too much "comfort" can lead to bad postures, bad habits and back pain, as well as tendonitis Sit towards the edge of the chair while exercising and keep your back straight Always stretch your hands, arms, wrists and fingers before you practice! Take it slowly "Excessive exercise of ourselves during practice can lead to joint pain and wrists. Listen to your body A"If you are beginning to feel pain in your hands, and forearms, it's probably time to take a break! Do yoga. Joking aside, Yoga is great for any musician, no matter what instrument you play. How to Have Fun with Bass Scales Running up and down on a scale over and improve our skills as bass players. Once you've gotten the underground shapes, it's time to explode from the â ¬ ÅScale" box. Try to mix the order of notes you're playing to create a melody! This is a great way to help you not only memorize your Bass Guitar Scales, but also helps develop your ear! Also experience the times to develop a sense of what you like in a Bass Guitar groove! Before you finish, give this little groove a spin. This bass riff starts on the small Pentatonic scale and ends on the Blues scale. See if you can spot where the change is happening! Play all notes with even tenses, so try playing with different tenses to find a slot you like! Skill tip: count out loud when possible to help you keep a good sense of timing. As the bassist, it's your job to hold the groove and beat with your drummer, so try to focus on the timing as many times as you can! Touching your foot will also help with this!
